February 2024 Queen City of the Platte City Council Update

As part of their goal to help expand the economic base of Evans, the City Council has placed an emphasis on city beautification. To help achieve this goal, the City Council voted last year to make a one-time, 10% reduction in the General Fund Reserve, freeing up just south of \$1.7 million. The City also received just over \$1 million more than what was expected from oil and gas tax revenue. With these additional funds, the Council elected to make several large, one-time equipment purchases for the City's Public Works Department.



In September, the Council approved the purchases of a new front-end loader and

two dump trucks but had \$1.76 million remaining for additional equipment Caterpillar 255 skid steer purchases. The Council decided to use the funds for five new vehicles – a single-axel dump truck and tandem axel dump truck, both with snowplow and drop spreader attachments, a skid steer and two tractors – as well as new traffic signal RADAR sensors to reduce traffic congestion in the City and a little north of \$400,000 for maintenance and upgrades to City-owned buildings. After these expenses, the City does have around \$300,000 remaining and will decide in the near future how the funds should best be spent.

With the growth Evans has been experiencing lately, the City Council approved a design contract with Benesch to build and install a four-way traffic signal setup at the busy 23rd Ave. / 34th St. (Anchor Dr.) intersection at the Jan. 16 meeting. Public safety is of critical importance to the City Council and with two elementary schools immediately east of the intersection and commercial and residential growth expanding in the area, installing this signal will go a long way in assuring the public is well-protected. The Council had budgeted \$125,00 for the design contract and Benesch's bid, which received the emphatic endorsement of the City Engineering and Public Works staffs, came in at \$119,000, representing another public project that came in under-budget.

The Council also tackled another large public infrastructure item in their January meetings - the expansion of the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant. The new plant, which came online in 2018, was almost immediately recognized as being near full capacity. As a result, an expansion is required to meet the City's expected growth needs looking as far forward as 2042. The City Engineering and Public Works staff did a great deal of due diligence

in the bid selection process. At the Jan. 16 meeting, a proposal was made by Advanced Engineering and Environmental Services (AE2S) to the City Council, for the design contract. A large contingent from AE2S was present to outline their experience and vision for the project and received the endorsement of the Council, which voted unanimously to approve the design contract for the beginning portion of the project, for which they will make regular, detailed reports to keep the Council abreast of progress.

GOVERNMENT 101 - Economic Development

The top priority for the Evans City Council is growing and diversifying our local economy. While that is most certainly a desirable – expanding the City's commercial base means more jobs for residents, additional shopping opportunities and increased sales tax revenue that City can use to provide better services and more amenities for our citizens to enjoy – an attainable goal, it cannot happen overnight. As a famous saying goes, "if you want shade today, the best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago."

A great deal of what we do here at City Hall every day is focused on planting the seeds for future economic growth.

When businesses look to expand by opening new locations, one of the primary factors they consider is the population density within a specific radius of their desired location. Therefore, in order to expand Evans' economic base, we need an influx of new residents; a popular phrase in economic development is 'retail follows rooftops.' This is why the Liberty Draw development (and others that could be sprouting up in the near future) is such a critical piece in growing the Evans economy.

To attract new residential development, the Council has stressed community beautification. By working to upgrade the overall look of the City, developers will be more interested in erecting new neighborhoods and expanding current ones. By enforcing the city codes, eliminating blight, sprucing up our City parks and evaluating landscaping along our major thoroughfares, the City instantly becomes more appealing for developers.

Another key piece that City Staff has worked long and hard on over the past year, and that was recently approved by the City Council, revolves around updating the City's development and zoning codes and other such regulations that make the City more friendly for both businesses and developers. By streamlining the process, making permitting more straightforward, adjusting zoning requirements to attract businesses, the City can grow the local economy organically by both bringing in new businesses and fostering an environment where current businesses will have opportunities to expand.

A critical component in this whole process is updating our infrastructure, particularly in areas that are ripe for commercial development. The City has invested a lot of time and resources and will continue to do so in the years to come along the Highway 85 corridor. This area sees a lot of daily vehicle traffic and is thus ripe for a broad array of commercial development. The City is therefore planning in advance, making sure that prospective commercial pads have the necessary vehicle access, have an adequate water supply and drainage for stormwater. These improvements make potential development sites more attractive and create nearly "turn-key" opportunities for expansion.

Last, but certainly not least, comes making sure our current businesses have all the tools we can provide to assure they are successful. The City in the beginning stages of developing a roster of local businesses, reaching out to them to see what we can do to help bring about their continued success and help lay the foundation for further success.

Important Information on RV, Boat, and Trailer Storage



Save the dates! • February 6 - City Council to consider moratorium on RV storage.

• March 5 - Council to discuss possible changes to storage ordinance.

In January, some Evans residents began receiving notices regarding outdoor storage of recreational vehicles, boats, and trailers on their property. After multiple work sessions by the Evans City Council, an ordinance - No. 804-23 - was developed and passed by the Council at the regular meeting on October 17, 2023. The Ordinance states that only one (1) RV, boat or trailer shall be located on a residential lot and that it must be stored in the rear yard, screened by a privacy fence that is at least five (5) feet from the property line.

This ordinance went into effect on January 1, 2024 and residents in violation of the ordinance were served with notices. Multiple residents contacted the City of Evans expressing concern over the ordinance and several followed up by addressing the City Council at the regular meeting on January 16, 2024 to express their displeasure.

In responding to citizen concerns, the Council directed City Staff to temporarily delay further enforcement of the ordinance. At the next regular meeting of the City Council, which will be held on Tuesday, February 6, 2024 at the Evans Community Complex, the Council will be considering a temporary moratorium to the enforcement of this code (Section 18.02.040.N). Additionally, any resident who received a notice in relation to this ordinance should be aware that citation related will not be acted upon until the Council provides additional direction to City Staff.

At the work session on March 5, 2024, at 5p.m., at the Evans Community Complex, the City Council will hold a work session where Section 18.02.040.N will be discussed in detail, including options for changes, and the members of the public are encouraged to attend.



"Puffing" is illegal in Colorado Take care of your 4-legged friends



With cold temperatures here, the Evans Police Department is reminding residents to make their vehicles a hard target for theft.

During winter months, car thieves often target "puffers," or vehicles left running and unattended as they warm up. This nickname stems from the puff of the exhaust visible during cold weather. Thieves often search for puffers because they are easy targets and then use these stolen cars to commit other crimes.

In Colorado, puffing is Class B traffic infraction. This means that in addition to being the victim of a theft, a vehicle owner can be fined for leaving their car running while unattended. The only exception to this law relates to vehicles with a remote ignition system.

The Evans Police Department is asking residents to either (1) stay with their vehicle when it's warming up or (2) use a remote start, lock the doors, and take the key with them. According to the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), temperatures below just 45 degrees can cause health problems for some pets.

The AVMA states, "It's a common belief that dogs and cats are more resistant than people to cold weather because of their fur, but it's untrue. Like people, cats and dogs are susceptible to frostbite and hypothermia and generally should be kept inside. Longer-haired and thick-coated dog breeds, such as huskies and other dogs bred for colder climates, are more tolerant of cold weather; but no pet should be left outside for long periods in belowfreezing weather."

Other cold weather pet protection tips from the AVMA include wiping off your dogs paws, as well as their chest and belly for short-legged dogs, after walks as they could pick up dangerous de-icing chemicals from the ground. Make sure your dog has a collar and is micro-chipped as if they wander away, cold and snow can limit their sense of smell and thus their ability to potentially find their way back home if lost.

What you will need to report a street light outage

The Pole number where the light is located—the pole number will be on the street side of the pole and will either have two numbers over two, or three over three.

For Example



Xcel Energy relies on the information you provide so please be as specific as possible. If the pole does not have a number, then please provide the address behind the pole, or a description of where the pole is located.

For example: The light is located on the Southwest corner of E. 16th Ave and Pennsylvania.



- 3. Light location: This is the Address where the light is located. Please provide as much specific information as you can.
- Comments: Provide any additional information that you believe would be helpful

Lastly: You may Add more outages if there are more than one or hit the submit button.

Once you submit the request you will be provided a confirmation number. Keep this number to refer back to if needed.

***Please note: Repairs are made in 5 business days unless there is more than routine maintenance is required.

y 2024 Evans The Road Abead

Road and Street Improvements

In 2023, Evans invested \$1.6 million for road maintenance and expansion projects all across the City. This figure is four-times greater than what was spent in 2020. This year, the City completed eight new construction and four major maintenance projects, all under budget.

In the past year alone, the City completed 489 individual concrete repairs including ADA ramps, pans, inlet decks, sidewalks and curb & gutter. 216 asphalt patches of various sizes were identified and repaired in advance of overlays and chip seal treatments. 22 local roadways and 34 roadway segments were chip sealed across three subdivisions. Since the City began pavement preservation work, 439 separate road segments have now been competed since 2018.


