# City Council Update



The month of April saw the Evans City Council make progress on a number of different fronts. At the meeting on April 2, the Council voted to approve three measures related to City infrastructure maintenance and improvement projects. The Council voted to approve updates to the fee schedule the City charges outside contractors who do utility work throughout the City. These modest increases will cover the costs absorbed by the City for work of this scope, especially in regard to staff time. Another measure approved by the Council was to award a design contract to Sanderson Stewart for work on infrastructure improvements at the four-lot property on the southwestern corner of Highway 85 and 31st Street, known as Evans Junction. This design work will go a long way towards making the property more appealing to potential developers. The final measure approved by the Council on April 2 regarded a no-cost obtainment of an easement by the City for a segment of private property along the Evans Ditch Trail so the City may access the space and perform maintenance work.

At the April 16 meeting, the Council voted 6-1 to approve the dispersal of \$18,000 of the \$21,000 in Council discretionary funds to several local non-profit organizations - LC Real Estate Group Foundation (\$5,000), Santa Cops of Weld County (\$4,000), 60+ Ride (\$3,000), Envision (\$2,000), Guadalupe Community Center (\$2,000) and Special Olympics Colorado (\$2,000).

The Council also voted unanimously to create an ad-hoc citizens advisory committee to address the parking and storage of RVs, boats and trailers on residential property. This hot-button issue was of great concern to many residents and the Council was excited to create the committee to give citizens a direct hand in offering policy recommendations that are in the best overall interest of the community (see more information on page 9). In March, the Council voted to rescind the ban on the storage and parking of these vehicles after hearing citizen feedback. The hope is that by directly engaging with the public, a policy can be developed that is acceptable to as many residents as possible. The Council also voted to make some changes to the rules pertaining to the Evans Cemetery, such as allowing residents to carry firearms on the premises and assuring the City is not liable for damage that may be caused by dogs or other domestic animals on the cemetery grounds.

**Looking ahead...** In May, the City Council is tentatively scheduled to review design and build concepts for a park in the Hunter's Reserve neighborhood, as well as for Ridge Park. A review of the wastewater treatment plant expansion will also be discussed and the Council is tentatively scheduled to consider a design contract for a new police station at May 21. Also on May 21, the Council will make their selections for the citizens ad-hoc committee as well as examine the results of the annual audit of City finances that was conducted and hear more information from representatives from Vero Broadband as they work on installing a fiberoptic network in Evans.

# **GOVERNMENT 101 - Developing the City Budget**



The City budget is the most important piece of policy the City creates every year. The budget reflects the priorities of the City Council – the people's elected officials – establishing how the finite resources will be used to improve and enhance the quality of life for all Evans residents.

Formulating the budget takes a great deal of time and work by both the Councilmembers and City Staff. Literally thousands of hours and hundreds of meetings are held throughout the months-long process to find the best possible use of taxpayer resources.

The budget formulation process begins with the City Council defining their priorities – economic development and community beautification – and then instructing the City Manager to find the best possible use of finite resources to make progress on those priorities. The City Manager then asks each City Department (Public Works, Parks & Recreation, Economic Development, etc.) to put together their list of wants and projected costs that align with Council priorities. Like with your family budget, not every "want" can be met – you might want to take the family on a two-week vacation to Hawaii, but it's possible that only one week in Florida is financially attainable. The same applies to the City budget.

Just like with a household budget, the City can, with a high degree of certainty, project expected costs for certain things. You know what your monthly house payment will be, we know how much our staff salaries are going to be. The City is also required by the City Charter to hold a minimum of 25% of the previous year's expenditures in the reserve fund – the City's savings account – to assure there are resources available should an unforeseen big expense arise, such as a natural disaster. Some years, the City devotes 50% of prior year expenditures into reserve fund, other years it is less, but has to be at least 25%. For the 2024 budget, the City put 40% in the bank and took the 10% extra to invest in City equipment to help meet the needs of the growing community.

After the City has determined how much will have to be spent on known costs and what will be saved in the reserve fund, the fun begins as the City Staff make recommendations to the Council for how to use the remaining revenue. Long discussions in meetings often lasting well into the night are held regularly as the options are debated and discussed among the Councilmembers and the City Staff. After the Councilmembers have reached agreement, a final draft budget is presented in the fall by the City Treasurer. Changes can still be made after that point, with budget amendments, and returned to the Council for consideration.



# **GOVERNMENT 101 - Developing the City Budget**

#### Where does the money come from?



The City takes in money from several sources, but all the money comes from the residents we serve, through taxes, fees, and charges for services. The largest, as is shown in the chart, is from sales taxes, which brings in more than half (55.4%) of all City revenue.


A challenge that the City of Evans faces from a budget perspective, one that many of our neighboring communities do not, is that we derive only a very small portion (4.8%) of revenue from property taxes.

The City of Evans mill levy rate is only 3.536 mills, much smaller than Greeley (11.274), Johnstown (23.947), Milliken (30.336) and Windsor (12.030). On a

home valued at \$400,000, roughly the average in our City, the homeowner will pay \$2,556 in yearly property taxes, but only \$95 from that amount goes to the City while \$1,351 goes to the school district, \$415 to the Evans Fire District, \$403 to Weld County and \$169 to Aims Community College.

Because the City derives such a large portion of its revenue from sales taxes, changes in the local economy can have a big impact, positive or negative, on the City budget. When the economy is booming and residents have more disposable income to spend on goods and services, the City sees the benefit of increased tax revenue. The other side of the coin, however, is that when times get tough, the City sees decreases in revenue and thus become less able to invest in improving the community by doing things like improving roads, building more parks, and offering more services to residents.

#### Where does the money go?



Once the City Council and City Staff know how much money they will take in, they can decide how to spend it. As was stated before, the City knows with a strong degree of certainly how much some things will cost, and the Council will have already made their decision as to how much to deposit into the reserve fund. Expenses like staff salaries are well known ahead of time as the City Administration and Police Department have a well-defined compensation plan. Like with the vast majority of enterprises, the City's biggest expense is its people.

Therefore, the big decisions when it comes to budgeting is how to spend

the remaining funds, often just a few million dollars. The Council must decide how best to invest this money to attain the best possible outcome for our tax paying residents and businesses. This is where the priorities set forth by the City Council are so important as those priorities will determine where the extra revenue is spent and how it is spent. With City Council's current priorities, investments are made in infrastructure, such as improved roadways, and in landscaping and park space to help improve the aesthetic qualities of the City in an effort to help attract new development. Investments have been made in the last few years in upgrading our major thoroughfares such as 37th Street and 35th Avenue, among others. New parks are being built and existing parks are being upgraded. The City has invested in underground infrastructure, such as stormwater drainage, at strategic locations to make them more appealing for potential new businesses to set up shop.

# Road and Street Improvements



With the arrival of spring comes road work and construction season. For 2024, the City of Evans has budgeted a total of \$1,450,000 for roadway maintenance projects which include concrete replacement work (pictured above from March in the Platte Valley neighborhood due east of Centennial Elementary School) as well as asphalt patching, asphalt surface treatment, crack seal and mill and overlay work. Over the course of the next few months, these types of projects will be undertaken in neighborhoods across the City. Maintenance projects like these - funded in part by the 1% road tax - serve to not only improve road conditions but are also aid pavement preservation, saving the City, and thus the taxpayers, enormous sums of money in the long run. ### Next Phase of 37th Street Widening Project Begins!

The next phase of the 37th Street widening project began on April 29th. This year's work will see 37th Street widened to two lanes in both directions between Sienna Avenue to Stampede Drive, beginning where the project ended last year. The roadway will be redone in its entire one-half mile stretch to a four-lane modern arterial roadway with a landscaped median irrigated with non-potable water. The project will also include some underground utility work including the lowering of some of the Atmos Energy lines and the construction of a storm sewer. This project is the next step in a major redesign of the main east-west thoroughfare in our City. During the opening phases of the project, the roadway has been closed in both directions. We know this is an inconvenience for many but it is necessary to assure a safe working environment. We ask that residents who detour through the adjacent neighborhoods be mindful of pedestrians. If anyone notices dangerous driving behavior, they are encouraged to





# Thefts From Vehicles Increasing



The Evans Police Department has seen a noticeable uptick in thefts from parked cars recently. In the some of the cases, the vehicles were locked, and the thieves broke into the car to remove personal items. In the majority of cases, however, the vehicles were left unlocked.

allowing the thieves to simply help themselves to whatever items of value they could find in the vehicles. The most frequent types of personal items stolen include wallets, purses, car stereos, driver's licenses, insurance and registration documents, laptop

the theft of personal items difficult for the victim, but many of these stolen items can be used in the commission of other, often times more serious, crimes including credit card fraud and identity theft, to name a few. Criminal vehicle trespass, more commonly called car break-ins, usually occur in clusters within neighborhoods.

Thieves will target a specific neighborhood one night and the next night or a few nights later, move on and hit other neighborhoods. The result is that cars parked anywhere throughout the City can become targets for theft. While this type of crime is disturbing and the Evans PD is doing all they car to prevent thefts, the good news is there

are a lot of easy, common sense actions residents and their visitors can take to reduce the chances of becoming a victim.





### The Evans Police Department is encouraging residents to:

- · Lock your car doors and seal your windows. As simple as it sounds, you would be surprised how many thefts occur from vehicles left unlocked or with the windows open overnight.
- Use all the safety features with which your vehicle is equipped. Make sure to activate your alarm and investigate quickly if you hear your car alarm go off while you are away from it.
- · Do not leave anything of value in your car. Leaving your purse or wallet, cell phone or laptop, your golf clubs or gym bag in plain view makes it an easy target for thieves. Even a zipped-up gym bag or backpack can be tempting for a thief as they cannot be sure if the bag contains dirty exercise clothes or something far more valuable like your bankbook, membership cards, small entertainment devices or expensive tools.
- · Park in a well-lit, secure area visible to others. Thieves prefer to break into vehicles parked in dark and secluded areas and avoid welllet areas as much as possible.
- · Form a neighborhood watch group. Banding together with your neighbors helps provide cover for when you, or your neighbors, are away. See page 6 for more.
- · Report the Crime. If you do find yourself a victim, report the crime immediately to the Evans PD.





You may have noticed our Community Service Technicians (CSTs) driving around town and wondered what their role within Evans PD is. When CSTs aren't handling traffic accidents, animal complaints or cold crimes (thefts, vandalism, etc) they're out patrolling neighborhoods in search of Evans Municipal and C.R.S violations. If you don't wish to receive a citation or have your vehicle green tagged (and risk it being towed) please obey the following-

#### **Parking Violations**


Vehicles can't be parked-

- 1. On a sidewalk or crosswalk
- 2. Within five feet of a public or private driveway;
- 3. Within fifteen feet of a fire hydrant;
- 4. Within twenty feet of a crosswalk at an intersection;
- 5. Within thirty feet upon the approach to any flashing beacon or signal, stop sign, yield sign, or traffic control signal located at the side of a roadway

#### When parking in a culdesac, vehicles must be-

"parked with the right-hand wheels parallel to and within twelve inches of the right-hand curb" meaning they need to be parked parallel to curb and not out from or perpendicular to the curb.

#### For Example-



#### Illegal parking-

- It is unlawful for any person to leave any vehicle which he or she owns or controls unattended on any
  portion of a street or highway right-of-way in the City for a period of seven (7) days or longer without
  moving or using such vehicle. Vehicles not registered to a nearby address shall be considered
  abandoned and may be ticketed and/or towed at the expense of the owner if such vehicles are not
  moved every 24 hours.
- It is unlawful for any person to leave in the public right-of-way any detached trailer, pickup camper, or boat. Such trailers may be towed by, or at the direction of, the City and such campers and boats may be removed and impounded at the expense of the owner.
- It is unlawful for any person to park any oversized private vehicle on public right-of-way in the area of the City zoned residential, except for temporary parking of vehicles used for loading or unloading of personal goods or property for a period not to exceed 24 hours.

# Outdoor Street Lighting How to report a Street Light Outage



#### What you will need to report a street light outage

The Pole number where the light is located—the pole number will be on the street side of the pole and will either have two numbers over two, or three over three.

For Example



Xcel Energy relies on the information you provide so please be as specific as possible. If the pole does not have a number, then please provide the address behind the pole, or a description of where the pole is located.

For example: The light is located on the Southwest corner of E. 16th Ave and Pennsylvania.



Finally: Enter your information.

- 1. Your name
- 2. Your email address: This is used to inform you when the light is repaired.
- Contact phone number: This will be used to contact you should we have any questions regarding your repair request.

Pole information: \*\*\*\*If an outdoor lighting pole is broken, please call Xcel Energy Customer Care at 1-800-895-4999.

- 1. Select the problem with the light
- 2. Pole number: This is where you would enter the two over two or three over three numbers on the pole.
- 3. Light location: This is the Address where the light is located. Please provide as much specific information as you can.
- 4. Comments: Provide any additional information that you believe would be helpful

Lastly: You may Add more outages if there are more than one or hit the submit button.

Once you submit the request you will be provided a confirmation number. Keep this number to refer back to if needed.

\*\*\*Please note: Repairs are made in 5 business days unless there is more than routine maintenance is required.
