

City Council Update

Evans City Council has prioritized economic development and community beautification and, in their two regular meetings in October, made considerable progress with initiatives in support of those goals.

One action approved by the Council is a major change to the City's Land Development Code. The code will provide more user-friendly land development processes with improved timelines, expectations, goals of accountability. The updated code provides a more market-oriented development process that will stimulate new development within the city. This brings Evans more Watch Live streams of the City Council in-line with neighboring communities and protects the charm and character that makes Evans unique.

The Council reviewed the proposed 2024 City budget in both meetings. The budget was formulated with heavy input from the Council working alongside City Staff to identify needs and determine priorities to achieve the goals of community beautification and economic development. The budget calls for targeted investments in new equipment for the city, including brand new dump trucks with snowplows and spreader attachments, a new street sweeper and a pair of Ventrac tractors for parks and open space maintenance. The City will also invest heavily in road maintenance and expansion projects and will make upgrades to public parks all over the City.



City Council Vacancy



Following the regular City Council meeting on Oct. 3, Evans City Councilwoman and Mayor Pro Tem Amanda Castle informed Mayor Mark Clark that she was resigning from her position. The resignation of Councilwoman Castle created a vacancy in Ward 3 (on the western side of the city) that must be filled. The vacancy announcement was made public on the City of Evans website following the Oct. 17 meeting and postcards informing residents in Ward 3 of the open seat were mailed on Oct. 18.

The City of Evans Home Rule Charter and Municipal Code calls for the City Council to appoint an eligible person to fill the vacancy within 90 days. The City Council has decided, just as they did in the previous vacancy in Ward 2 that was filled by Councilman Crabtree, to make the appointment based on a process whereby eligible residents can submit applications to fill the seat and the Council will conduct interviews with the applicants before selecting a resident to fill the vacancy. Applications for individuals interested in the City Council vacancy - which can be downloaded from the City website or picked up from the Evans Community Complex at 1100 37th Street - are due by Nov. 29 at 1:00 p.m. On Dec. 6 or 7, the Council will conduct interviews with each eligible applicant and the individual the Council selects to fill the vacancy will be announced at the regular meeting on Dec. 19, during which the new Council member will be sworn in.

Evans City Council appoints Ward 1 Councilwoman Laura Speer as Mayor Pro Tem

The resignation of Councilwoman Castle also created a vacancy at the Mayor Pro Tem position. The role of Mayor Pro Tem is to serve in the same capacity as the Mayor when the official Mayor is absent from meetings. At the meeting on Oct. 17, the Council unanimously approved Ward 1 Councilwoman Laura Speer as Mayor Pro Tem.



On October 20, Evans Mayor Mark Clark delivered the 2023 State of the City Address at the Riverside Library. Mayor Clark outlined the extraordinary progress the city has made over the last year and provided a preview of the big things to come in 2024. In October, both QuikTrip and the Rush Event Center opened their doors in Evans. These two new businesses not only provide convenience retail and a family fun events center to local residents, they help bring in more sales tax revenue that the City will use to make further upgrades to our road networks and parks and open space areas. The Mayor also announced that, in the coming months, the City will be welcoming more new businesses, furthering the Council's goals of economic development and diversification. It was

announced that the city has design plans for additional trails along Ashcroft draw and Evans Ditch open spaces and will be reviewing new designs for Davinci Park.



The City was honored to have the Northridge High School Color Guard present the American flag.

Mayor Clark explained a tenet of community planning is that "retail follows rooftops" and in order for Evans to continue to expand its commercial base, it must also work to create an influx of new residents. Therefore, it was great news for the City that construction work began recently in the Liberty Draw development. Baessler Homes, the developer at Liberty Draw, will build out the neighborhood to 700 single and multifamily homes. The City has seen a sharp uptick in building permits for the site. Additionally, the second phase of Crescent Cove, named The Reserve, will bring over 250 new apartment homes to the north side of the City.



GOVERNMENT 101 - WHAT IS THE COUNCIL-MANAGER FORM OF GOVERNMENT?

Our City operates under what political scientists call the "Council-Manager" form of government. This structure is very popular across the United States for medium sized cities and is used by many of our neighboring communities including Greeley, Loveland, Fort Collins, Johnstown, and Berthoud. So, what is the Council-Manager form of government and how does it work?

The Council-Manager form of government closely resembles a large publicly traded corporation, like Wal-Mart or Bank of America, where the shareholders elect a board of directors, that board of directors appoints a CEO and the CEO then hires department heads and supporting staff. In government, the voters elect a Mayor and City Council who in turn appoint a City Manager who serves as the CEO of the City. Evans' current City Manager, Cody Sims, was given a glowing performance review from the City Council in October and received a two-year contract extension. Cody brings a great deal of education and experience to his role as City Manager, and it is his No. 1 job to carry out the vision of the City Council. Cody works long hours and has final say over everything we do here in the Evans City government. He works closely will all City department heads -Finance, Community Development, Economic Development, Public Works, Human Resources, Parks & Recreation, Information Technology, and the Police Department - so he must be aware of all the different projects our staff is working on as we strive to provide the best possible service to residents. He reports directly to his boss, the City Council - when they want something done, it's Cody's job to do it, so he must be on top of everything that everyone is doing at any given time. Experts say the Council-Manager form of government is preferable to other forms as it permits City Administration positions to be filled on the basis of merit rather than as political appointments, which typically results in subject matter experts filling important roles on the City staff.

Road and Street Improvements

In 2023, Evans is investing \$1.6 million for road maintenance and expansion projects all across the city. This figure is four-times greater than what was spent in 2020.

We know that road construction projects can be a hassle for everyone, believe us, we feel it too, but the projects are necessary to assure we have the physical infrastructure in place to support our growing City. Thanks to the 1% road tax that was approved by Evans voters in 2020, our roads and streets have undergone tremendous improvements and the City engineering team has plans to do much more. This year alone the City has completed asphalt and concrete replacement projects on 42nd Street, 49th Street, Empire Street, in the Grapevine Hollow, Ashcroft Heights, Hunter's Reserve, and North Point Neighborhoods, and along 23rd Avenue from 32nd Street to 37th Street.


